Mental Health Matters Day

Mental Health Matters Day Brings Together Leaders and Visionaries: Last week's Mental Health Matters Day at the State Capitol captured the energy of the growing Each Mind Matters Movement, with leaders and visionaries from all over the state coming together to share ideas, tools and resources for reducing stigma and raising awareness of mental health. Attendees were empowered to bring learning opportunities back to their communities through a dynamic

speaking program and resource booths hosted by mental health and community-based organizations across California. Diverse perspectives from the movement were shared by mental health champion and <u>Senate President pro tem Darrell Steinberg</u>, and new mental health leaders from students to elected leaders. Prior to the rally, participants in the Directing Change Student Video Contest met with legislators to share their vision for ending stigma. Capping the day, State Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Torlakson participated in the Directing Change awards ceremony, which also included Director Bradley Buecker and Actor Max Adler from Fox's hit series "Glee." Contest Inspires New Generation of Californians to "Direct Change": The Second Annual Directing Change Student Video Contest was met with great success! 432 submissions were received, representing 996 students from 31 counties. Participating high school and University of California students produced 60-second public service announcements to end the silence on mental illness and prevent suicide, empowering their community to change the way they view student mental health. Several finalists' contributions to combating stigma and reducing suicide have been profiled in the news media:

- <u>Livingston High junior Gerardo Aquilar's</u> video shows students holding candles, representative of hope, as they speak about the importance of suicide prevention.
- <u>Franklin High School junior Giana Shibata-Bardaro's</u> video focuses on two friends; one of whom helps the other overcome thoughts of suicide and connects them to help.
- <u>Enochs High students</u> Caleb Meyer, Jacob McNeilly, Justin Benziger, Brandon Wilcox, Mariah Davis and Megan Johnson's video depicts young people, through positive and supportive language, countering a friend's negative perception of herself and thoughts of suicide.
- <u>UCSB student Kathleen Oum's</u> video draws attention to the idea that depression can be escapable.

The groundbreaking Directing Change program was awarded the 2014 Innovative Award from the California Mental Health Advocates for Children and Youth, recognizing how the contest is pioneering possibilities for using technology to engage young people in mental health awareness and stigma reduction.
